A pilot project was announced at our AGM whereby members could stop at the front gates and pick up gloves and a garbage bag and, while walking the beach, help keep it tidy.

The westerlies continue to blow a variety of man-made items (garbage) onto our shorelines and the winds also pick up light material and blow it into the grasses.

Park Staff members do a good job grooming and cleaning, but just cannot keep up. An assessment will be done this fall to see if complaints from visitors are reduced and just how many gloves and garbage bags were handed out. There is still time to participate as long as there is an attendant on the gates (this project ends Thanksgiving weekend).

Our organization continues to undertake many important activities, and new volunteers are most welcome to join us and become members.

Some Factoids ...

... from the AGM

In 2015, The Friends contributed about \$87,000 to Presqu'ile Park, in educational programs and environmental projects (up 34% from 2014).

The Gross Financial Contribution in 2015 was up 233%, when compared to 2010.

Between 2010 and 2015, we spent almost \$500,000 achieving our vision.

... about Christmas at Presqu'ile Arts and Crafts

This year we mark our 25th annual show. Over 250 volunteers help to make this show such a huge success.

... about Kids 'n Nature

100 boys and girls attended our 2016 Kids 'n Nature Summer Camps (in 2015 we had 80 campers).

1895 students participated in our Kids n' Nature School Group Program during the spring shoulder season in 2016.

All four of our camp weeks were fully subscribed. Our themes this year were **Water World**, **Super Survival**, **Forest Adventures**, and **Shipwrecks and Pirates**.

We were able to extend registration to 25 kids per camp this year, as we received a grant from Canada Summer Jobs to hire our third camp leader, Carrie.

That adds up to 100 lucky participants in our **Kids 'n Nature** Summer Camp program.

And, thank you to the **Trenton Rope Store**. The owner was so generous and donated all the para-cord we used for the campers to make bracelets each week, as well as some rope we needed for equipment.

SPRING SCHOOL GROUP PROGRAM

Earlier in the year, our interpreters, **Krista** and **Caroline** had a very successful and busy spring delivering the **Kids 'n Nature** School Group Program to local elementary school children.

There was much positive feedback from the teachers, who were very thankful for the free programming.

In total, we delivered in-school programs to 797 children in 38 classes, and in-Park programs to 998 children in 44 classes.

So far this year, and adding in the campers, 1895 children have enjoyed learning about the rich biodiversity of Presqu'ile Provincial Park through the **Kids 'n Nature** program.

It is very rewarding to see the excitement and curiosity displayed by the students and campers and the satisfaction of teachers and parents with the program.

We are very thankful for all the financial support we have received from The Friends, and the Brighton Health Services Centre.

We invite teachers, homeschool groups, and Scouts and Guides leaders to book an in-class or in-park visit this September or October to experience the **Kids 'n Nature** School Group Programs first hand.

Presqu'ile Piping Plovers - 100 years in the making

This year marked the first time **Piping Plovers** are known to have nested at Presqu'ile in 100 years. These are small shorebirds that nest on sandy beaches.

They declined rapidly in North America after WWII as more and more people used sandy beaches to play on. By the mid-1980s there were only 12 nesting pairs left on the Great Lakes, all in Michigan. The Americans put in a conservation program and slowly the numbers increased.

At Presqu'ile we have seen Piping Plovers every spring for the last decade but these birds always moved on. There are no records of Piping Plovers having stayed to nest since 1916.

Then, this year three birds, hatched at Wasaga Beach in 2015, showed up at Presqu'ile in mid-May. Instead of moving on, the birds started exhibiting breeding behaviour! Two males were courting the single female.

To make it more of a dramatic romantic triangle, numbered bands on the birds' legs indicated the two males were brothers! In the end, one brother won out and by June 3 we had a nest with 4 eggs.

Now, when an endangered species starts nesting in your park all kinds of legislative requirements kick in. We could no longer rake the beach within 500 metres of the nest and we had to put in place some protective measures. A 100m square exclusion rope fence went up around the nest and a 3 metre 'cage' went over the nest. This cage had holes big enough for the small plovers to get through but kept out potential predators such as gulls, raccoons, and coyotes.

The other thing we needed were people to keep an eye on the birds and tell other beach goers about them and why certain areas of the beach could not be used. An appeal went out from The Friends' website, which was

passed on to others, and we got an overwhelming response of people wanting to help.

We were also able to hire a student, Elizabeth Steadman, to coordinate these volunteers. What started out looking like an overwhelming task now became manageable.

After a start-up orientation meeting, three three-hour shifts a day were organized of 1 or 2 volunteers to set up on the beach and be **Plover Monitors**. Monitoring started on June 23 and really picked up after the chicks hatched on June 28.

Only 3 eggs hatched but these gave both parents and monitors all they could handle as they would often wander in three different directions at once and then seemingly disappear for an hour or two when they lay down for a nap.

Volunteers realized they needed to be on the beach longer than the nine hours and pushed for early morning and evening shifts, which we instigated during the busiest times.

Everyone persevered, and the chicks learned to listen to their parents, stayed safe, and grew up. As is usual, the Mom left 13 days after hatching and the Dad left after the chicks started flying at 4 weeks of age.

The last three weeks were a period of winding down the monitoring as the chicks moved up and down the beach and even over to the islands. They were harder to keep track of but we wanted to keep tabs on them so we would know for sure when they left.

Our core volunteers kept at it and the last chick was seen on Monday, August 15, 7 weeks after hatching.

We had done it! Helped a fragile endangered species raise a family and see them on their way in two months. They are on their own now and hopefully will prosper and we will see some or all of these birds back in 2017.

It was a remarkable achievement and one possible only through the help of 49 different individuals that spent 700+ person hours on the beach and talked to scores of people about what special event was unfolding on Presqu'ile Beach.

A job well done and a big **THANK YOU** to all.

The summer of 2016 will no doubt be known as one of the hottest and driest on record. What this meant at the Park was higher visitation than normal, with many going to the beach, but also to our visitor centres and programs.

For me personally, it was the summer of the Piping Plover, and I spent much time on the beach and organizing the plover monitoring volunteers and coordinator (*see page 8*), at the expense of Natural Heritage Education (NHE).

There was some talk that NHE students had felt like orphans with their *Plover Dad* away. No worries though as the NHE crew were effectively led by veterans **Allyson Parker** (8 years at Presqu'ile Park), **Laura McClintock** (5 years) and **Kristen Osborne** (4 years) in the Nature Centre.

Other returning staff, **Natasha Lewis**, **Vivienne Wu**, and **Rachel Revoy**, also helped get the newer staff, **Natalie Iezzi**, **Riley Hannigan**, **Meaghan Peterson**, and **Brittany Stevens** up and running. And run they did, presenting over 180 programs in 10 weeks!

Programs ranged from Spinning (wool) Demonstrations, Insect Avengers, Fossil Hunts, to screaming baby birds at Monarchs and Migrants Weekend.

We partnered with the **Belleville Astronomy Club** this year for an exploration of the solar system that went from the day use area to Jupiter and beyond.

Other special guests this year included **Peter Solmes** for a CD release on Canada Day and **Learn to Fish** on Labour Day Weekend.

Peter Solmes was also back for his regular gig during History Weekend, which is always a highlight of the summer, involving the whole NHE staff for the whole weekend.

While all the NHE staff put in an exemplary effort this year, our end of season NHE awards did highlight a few individuals.

Rachel Ravoy was presented with the Lighthouse Award for her work in the Lighthouse Interpretive Centre and **Brittany Stevens** received the Nature Centre Award. **Natasha Lewis** received the Wise Owl Award for top score on our weekly quizzes illustrating her knowledge of Presqu'ile nature and history. Congratulations to all.

It was a busy, hot, and sticky summer, and exhaustion was shown on many faces by the end, but the NHE staff, along with all our Park co-workers, worked hard throughout to provide our visitors with a memorable and enjoyable visit.

As always, thanks to The Friends for supporting staff positions so that we can continue to provide quality educational programs.

Adjacent to the Christmas House is the Tea Room, located in Stonehedge, another heritage home.



Volunteers make improvements to the Pioneer and Newcastle Trails

Many trail monitors, volunteers, and Park Staff were busy, for the third year, replacing old footbridges (*aka boardwalks*), lengthening some, and spanning additional wet areas.

Since the fall of 2014, the team has built 6 footbridges on Pioneer Trail, almost 700 feet in length.

This year, the Park has been more diligent in cutting grass on the sides of the trails to help walkers and dogs avoid deer ticks. A big thank you to them.

So, the Pioneer Trail is much more user-friendly. It is now possible to walk this trail much later into a wet fall and weeks earlier in the spring.


The Pioneer Trail can be accessed at the car park just past the day-use area, or, in the shoulder seasons, from the Campground Office car park.
