

The Grand Trunk Railway Station

There were 32 Grand Trunk railway stations built between Toronto and Montreal. This station was constructed in 1857 and is one of nine remaining. Despite its location on the busiest rail line in Canada, the station was closed in 1962 due to declining passenger traffic. The building remained empty until 1996 when a local railway enthusiast purchased the property and opened Memory Junction Railway Museum.

On this three acre property stands the original Grand Trunk Station, a baggage shed, hops barn and a storage building. The museum is also the home of engine #2534, a massive locomotive built in 1906. Engine #2534 is one of three remaining N-4—a class engines in existence.

Massive coal fired steam locomotives like this one played a major role in opening up the area to settlement.



The Brighton train station promoted the development of industry and agriculture in the local area.



At one time, regular passenger service to Brighton was available. Service was suspended in 1962.
